Special Initiatives

Perinatal Mental Health at St. Luke's

Founded in 1871 by Episcopal priest Dr. Thomas Brotherton, St. Luke's is one of San Francisco's safety net hospitals, serving the uninsured and underserved. In 2017, Episcopal Impact Fund's affiliate, the Brotherton Fund, donated \$1 million to create a perinatal mental health endowment, the first such fund in San Francisco. This fund which will be used to support the critical mental health needs of the growing population of mothers and infants South of Market.

Planting with Purpose

With a grant from the State of California, Episcopal Impact Fund is establishing greener, healthier neighborhoods in underserved communities. St. James Episcopal ("Santiago") parishioners and Episcopal Impact Fund grantees Indigenous Permaculture and Urban ReLeaf have created a community garden that provides fresh produce for Santiago's weekly food pantry and have planted trees throughout East Oakland, cleaning the air and beautifying the environment.

St. Monnica's Mutual Housing

Named for the devoted and determined mother of St. Augustine, St. Monnica's goal is to create-stable, supportive, low-cost housing for young families in Marin County, ensuring that our neighbors have a place to call home. Episcopal Impact Fund's assistance will help St. Monnica's take the first steps toward creating new low-income housing in Marin County.

ALAMEDA DEANERY

- Attitudinal Healing Center works with Oakland school children, helping
 them become self-aware and inspired through art, creativity and education,
 and to make positive choices that will break the cycle of violence in their
 communities.
- Building Futures with Women and Children is part of the Rapid Rehousing Initiative in Alameda County, providing temporary shelter for mothers and children who are victims of domestic violence and putting them on a path to stable, sustainable housing.
- Mindful Life Project teaches mindfulness in schools in low-income communities, helping children navigate difficult emotions and breaking the cycle of defiance, violence, suspensions and expulsions that traps children in poverty.
- Urban ReLeaf addresses environmental injustice by planting trees in impoverished areas of Oakland and Richmond, while teaching job-readiness skills and employing at-risk teens.





CONTRA COSTA DEANERY

- Monument Crisis Center helps stabilize low-income families and families in crisis by providing connections to resources and services, healthy food and children's programs.

- Writer Coach Connection provides trained volunteer "coaches" who teach low-income East Bay high school students to become proficient writers.

MARIN DEANERY

- Big Brothers Big Sisters of the North Bay helps children facing adversity improve their lives through the power of one-to-one mentoring.
- Marin Pregnancy Clinic provides prenatal medical care and practical solutions to pregnant women with or without insurance. ♥

PENINSULA DEANERY

- Abundant Grace / Coastside Worker trains and empowers members of the Latina community to be active community leaders in social justice efforts.
- Samaritan House provides food, access to shelter, healthcare, and a broad range of supportive services in San Mateo County.
- Holy Child & St. Martin Episcopal Church operates a hot meal program for local shelter residents.
- San Francisco Host Lions Club of the Peninsula's network of volunteers work together to answer the needs that challenge their community, including healthcare screenings.

SAN FRANCISCO DEANERY

- Community Grows teaches job readiness skills to at-risk youth through its BEETs (Band of Environmentally Educated and Employable Teens) program, helping them grow as leaders and develop job skills.
- Homeless Prenatal Project provides intensive education and employment services to precariously housed or homeless mothers.



- SF Achievers promotes positive life outcomes for vulnerable African
 American males from San Francisco public schools through community-building, mentoring, and counseling, in addition to financial support for college.
- **SF CASA** transforms the lives of abused and neglected foster youth by providing one consistent, caring volunteer advocate, trained to address each child's needs in court and in the community. \bigcirc
- The Community Preschool at Grace Cathedral provides a free, high-quality preschool experience to children from low-income families in the underserved Tenderloin neighborhood.

SOUTHERN ALAMEDA

- **Beyond Emancipation** supports current and former foster youth in their transition to life as independent adults. \bigcirc \bigcirc
- FESCO operates a variety of family shelters and supportive housing sites in southern Alameda County that help people secure employment and move into stable housing.
- **Big Heart Wellness Center** provides nutritional education, legal assistance, mental health referrals and cooking classes, helping community members improve the wellness in their lives. •

- **Episcopal Community Services** provides shelter, food and essential services to homeless San Franciscans using a holistic approach addressing the multiple causes of homelessness. •
- Good Samaritan Family Resource Center uses a two-generation strategy to help new immigrants and their children obtain the skills, support and resources they need to overcome the challenges of poverty and displacement.
- The Gubbio Project provides a sacred space and sanctuary for unhoused people in need of safe, compassionate respite during the day.
- Grace Cathedral Jail Ministry helps incarcerated women and men connect with God, themselves, each other, and their families in ways that reflect love and generosity.
- Art with Elders provides programs that celebrate the wisdom, talents and creativity of older adults living in long-term care facilities. •
- **Ohlhoff Recovery Programs** provides a continuum of effective, affordable treatment for drug and alcohol addiction. •
- **Sojourn Chaplaincy** provides multifaith spiritual care at San Francisco General Hospital, including the indigent and incarcerated.
