Attitudinal Healing Connection empowers young people in Oakland and San Francisco to be self-aware and inspired through art, creativity, and education, helping them make positive choices to break the cycle of violence for themselves and their communities.

### Building Opportunities for Self-Sufficiency (BOSS) © F

BOSS helps homeless, poor, and disabled people achieve health and self-sufficiency, and to fight against the root causes of poverty and homelessness in Alameda and Contra Costa counties.

### First Place for Youth C ch

First Place helps foster youth in San Francisco, Alameda and Contra Costa counties build the skills necessary to make a successful transition to self-sufficiency and responsible adulthood.

### 

Hope Horizon, formerly Bayshore Christian Ministries, works to break the cycle of poverty in East Palo Alto and East Menlo Park by providing after-school and summer programs to support the academic, social, and physical development of youth.

### Family Connections Centers C F ch

Family Connections Centers supports the development of strong, healthy families and thriving communities through community-based, culturally humble, multilingual programming that adapts to the needs of families in San Francisco.

### Family Emergency Shelter Coalition (FESCO) © F &

FESCO serves families experiencing homelessness in Alameda County by providing safe, stable temporary housing and supporting their transition to permanent housing through job training, childcare and other necessary services.

### 

Home & Hope provides the safe haven of temporary housing for San Mateo County families facing homelessness while developing a customized, pragmatic plan of action to help them secure long-term housing and regain self-sufficiency.

### Hope Solutions (F) ch

Hope Solutions, formerly Contra Costa Interfaith Housing, heals the effects of poverty and homelessness by providing permanent housing solutions and vital support services to highly vulnerable families and individuals in Contra Costa County.

### Options Recovery Programs (F) ch

Since 2018, Options has provided a residential program for pregnant women and new mothers in recovery in Alameda County, providing structure, support and community to help them build sober living skills and succeed in the community.

### Rebuilding Together SF C F

Rebuilding Together preserves affordable housing in San Francisco by addressing home safety repairs, deferred maintenance, and code violations for low-income residents. Rebuilding Together stabilizes residents and prevents displacement of San Francisco's most vulnerable populations.

### Rise University Preparatory C F ch

Located in the Bayview Hunters Point neighborhood, Rise Prep will graduate its first senior class in 2024 with a goal of 100% matriculation to four-year colleges. Rise's innovative approach to learning and human development inspires student and family flourishing, embracing a full identity as children of God.

### Sister to Sister 2 / Serenity House © F

Serenity House in West Oakland provides housing, substance use treatment, and wrap-around support services for women. Their highly individualized services include one-onone counseling, healing groups, case-management, benefits advocacy, workforce development, and family reunification support.

### St. Vincent de Paul Society of Marin © F @

St. Vincent de Paul provides compassionate care and critical services to Marin County residents who are struggling to make ends meet, with a goal of ending homelessness, hunger and isolation.

### The Village Project C ch

Because it takes a village to raise a child, the Village Project provides a safe haven for academic, cultural and enrichment activities for underserved San Francisco youth and their families.

### Youth Spirit Artworks © ch

As part of its "100 Homes for 100 Youth" initiative, Youth Spirit Artworks created a Tiny House Village in Oakland for homeless youth of Berkeley and Oakland. This temporary housing includes wrap-around services to enable residents to exit to stable permanent housing.

### NEIGHBORS HELPING NEIGHBORS

### CONGREGATIONAL SPOTLIGHT: Christ Episcopal Church, Alameda

"In addition to a homeless shelter and various meal programs, the Homeless Shower Program will offer some dignity and sanitation to our homeless brothers and sisters."

Due to safety concerns regarding COVID-19, Christ Church was forced to cancel the homeless warming shelter they've offered for three years. But their commitment to their homeless brothers and sisters never waned, so in collaboration with the City of Alameda Community Development Department and with the support of Episcopal Impact Fund, the congregation created a new program providing showers to their unhoused neighbors. The program began operating weekly as COVID restrictions lifted. It provides 15-minute showers, clean towels, toiletries, new undergarments and lunch.

The program will run year-round in two newly constructed onsite shower facilities staffed by volunteers from Christ Church and the wider community. A grant from Episcopal Impact Fund closed the construction funding gap and allowed the showers to open without delay.

"Personal hygiene is a fundamental human need that maintains our dignity," said Ana Bagtas of the City of Alameda's Community Development Department. "This shower program will provide our unhoused Alamedans a reliable resource that will give them a sense of stability. We are grateful to Christ Church for this partnership."

Is your congregation doing good work in your community? Please let us know! This year's congregational grant cycle opens on May 24th with applications due in late June. Episcopal Impact Fund welcomes applications from congregations throughout the Diocese of California.

### **Episcopal Impact Fund's Congregational Grants recognize the important outreach** programs based in the churches and ministries of our Diocese.

Our congregations do exceptional work, often with little support. It is an important part of Episcopal Impact Fund's mission to assist churches that serve their low-income neighbors. We are pleased to share with you the recipients of our 2021 grants:

### All Saints' Episcopal Church, San Leandro

All Saints operates a bi-monthly food pantry that provides bagged groceries to over 240 households per pantry.

### All Saints' Episcopal Church, San Francisco

All Saints has provided support and management of the Haight Ashbury Community Services food program for 50

### All Souls Episcopal Parish, Berkeley

All Souls supports local families living in RV encampments by providing sewage waste removal and access to showers and laundry facilities.

### **Episcopal Church of the Nativity, San Rafael**

Episcopal Church of the Nativity supports The Street Chaplaincy, which brings compassionate spiritual care to unsheltered people in Marin, building and strengthening a community that includes housed and unhoused people.

### **Grace Cathedral, San Francisco**

The Community Preschool at Grace Cathedral is an early childhood education program that serves San Francisco families of diverse socioeconomic backgrounds.

### St. Augustine's Episcopal Church, Oakland

St. Augustine's provides bagged groceries to up to 75 people per month.

### The Episcopal Church of St. Mary the Virgin, San Francisco

St. Mary's Justice Ministries partner with Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity to support and accompany newly arrived individual and family migrants and asylum-seekers.

### St. James Episcopal Church/Iglesia Episcopal de Santiago, Oakland

Iglesia de Santiago offered Afro-Peruvian music and dance classes to local families.

### St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Belvedere

St. Stephen's supports the St. Vincent de Paul Society of Marin's bagged meal distribution.

### St. Gregory of Nyssa Episcopal Church, San Francisco

St. Gregory's hosts a food pantry that provides free, healthy groceries to up to 600 families weekly.

### The Episcopal Church of St. John the Evangelist, San Francisco

St. John's hosts The Gubbio Project, which provides sacred space, sanctuary, and food for up to 100 unhoused people in need of safe, compassionate respite daily.



# **SHARING THE LOVE**

For more than 40 years, Episcopal Impact Fund has honored its heritage with additional community-focused grants based on the Episcopal values of faithfulness, inclusiveness and compassion.

Episcopal Impact Fund administers The Brotherton Fund, named after the founder of the former St. Luke's Hospital (now the Mission/Bernal Campus of CPMC). This hospital serves many low-income, uninsured and underinsured San Franciscans.

Episcopal Impact Fund is the founder and lead funder of two innovative programs at the hospital:

- The Perinatal Mental Healthcare Program
   provides critical psychiatric and psychological
   care to pregnant women and new mothers free
   of charge. By embedding this program within
   existing labor and delivery services, we ensure
   that women receive the care they need in a
   familiar and trusted setting.
- The Pediatric Mental Healthcare Program brings onsite, outpatient mental health care resources to low-income children and their families. Our grant enables these services to be offered free of charge to all patients.

On behalf of the Diocese of California, Episcopal Impact Fund administers four endowments that specifically serve elders, the incarcerated, and people in recovery. This year, our social ministry grants went to:

### **Art with Elders**

Programs that celebrate the wisdom, talent and creativity of older adults living in long-term care facilities.

### **Grace Cathedral Jail Ministry**

Helping incarcerated people connect with God, themselves, each other and their families in ways that reflect love and generosity.

### **Ohlhoff Recovery Programs**

A continuum of effective, affordable treatment for drug and alcohol addiction.

### Sojourn Chaplaincy

Multi-faith spiritual care for patients and staff at San Francisco General Hospital, including the indigent and incarcerated.
